#### University Professor Featured on WAFB-TV9 for Volunteer Work

According to Professor Doze Butler, she was taught by her parents at an early age the importance of giving something back in the form of service to others. Professor Butler's work with Habitat for Humanities was featured on the Channel 9 Evening News show. Through her own volunteerism, Professor Butler demonstrates for her students and others the importance of "giving back" through service.

Southern University has an apparel marketing class that once a semester takes on a very unusual assignment. Curtis Morton is one of the students Doze Butler hijacks for Habitat. "It was extra credit, and we did it to get our grades up, but once we got out there, we started doing it on our own," said Morton. "We started around 9 a.m. and kept working until 3." They worked in the heat and on a Saturday on Habitat for Humanity's house for a family named Mahogany.

Why Habitat? Butler may not have realized where it all started until 9 News spoke with her. You see, when she was a child in Tallulah, Louisiana, fire consumed her family's home. "It was just a few days before Christmas and we lost everything that we had, and the community reached out to us," said Butler. "I really think that that is what started me. I'm getting emotional when I start thinking about that!" She says it was difficult, but the way the community reached out to her family got her started giving back.

Over a decade ago, Doze began supporting Habitat while she lived in Wisconsin and then in Texas. In 2004, shortly after she moved back to Baton Rouge, Doze began volunteering on the Women Build construction site. She took three construction classes at the Red Shoes that Women Build House Leader Carol "Cooter" Smith taught. "Cooter taught me to hammer. Turns out, I had been hammering wrong," she said.

Now an accomplished carpenter, Doze's favorite day on site is framing day.

Students at Southern must do community service hours, but this volunteer project is not part of the required stuff. This teacher lives the philosophy that giving is part of a worthwhile life. And when students leave Doze Butler's class, they know how to give and they know why.

#### SUSLA Announces New School of Nursing

After more than two and a half years, Southern University at Shreveport will have the space to double the amount of students in the nursing program. Officials announced Friday the acquisition of the Allen Building on the corner of Texas and McNeil streets in downtown Shreveport. The building, next door to the university's downtown location, will house the school of nursing. "Southern continues to evolve because of faculty and staff," said Ray Belton, SUSLA chancellor. "This day enables us to take the next step."

The finalized purchase came during some of the deepest budget cuts to higher education in recent years. The Louisiana Board of Regents agreed to purchase a building for the dramatic growth of the nursing program. As the state higher education management board began the process, budget cuts hit. But even as the cuts kept coming, officials worked on securing the building. The Regents, with help from Willis Knighton, were able to purchase the building for \$387,000. SUSLA also received some funding from the state, \$3 million, to help renovate the building. Belton said he expected renovation on the 25,797-squarefoot building to begin in the fall.



The nursing program started in 2005 and has experienced increasing growth every year. Each year more than 300 applicants apply for 70 spots in the program, said Sandra Tucker, nursing dean. Each year, its graduates have scored in the 90th percentile on the National Counsel Licensure exam for registered nurses. Tucker has attributed the success of the program to its flexibility. They work with students'

individual needs and teach them from where they are academically. However, for all the flexibility, it's one of the toughest programs on campus. To apply, prospective students have to complete the pre-admission exam, have a 2.5 grade-point average in at least 12 hours of classes taken at SUSLA and have taken all the prerequisites. Tucker said with the extra space the program will be able accept more students and grow two programs — certified nursing and a license practice nursing — where students can easily feed from one into the other. That means students can start in the certified nursing program and go directly into the LPN program. Tucker said the cohort of students selected will start in May with the transition happening January 2012.

Tucker also she there would be a need to add more faculty. She anticipates about 300 to 400 students in the new building with 30 to 40 faculty members. "With the space and the money, we can expand," she said. "We can find the faculty. We get calls of nurses wanting to teach in our program all the time."

As a result, the allied health programs will also expand, Belton said. With the school of nursing moving next door, the allied health programs will stay in its current building and grow. However, will all the additional students coming in, parking will be more of an issue downtown. Belton said the school's foundation is in preliminary conversations with the other building owners on the block to build a multilevel parking garage.


David Raines Community Health Centers provided cholesterol testing and Smart Health Care provided glucose testing.

The workshop which was organized and presented by County Agent Terrence Marshall, featured instructions on the Worker Protection Standard for Private Pesticide Applicators, Spray Drift Management, and Recognizing Heat Stress.

Thirty workshop participants were re-certified in the safe use of pesticides. An evaluation of the program revealed that 95% of the participants agreed that the workshop gave them new knowledge and skills to ensure environmental safety and health.

# Agent in Avoyelles teaches lesson on veggies

Melody R. Coco, nutrition assistant, Southern University Ag Center in Avoyelles Parish discussed the importance of eating vegetables to the Pre-K classes in Avoyelles during a presentation entitled "Veggies, from the Earth to the Tummy."

This presentation helped the children understand how important it is for them to have a particular number of servings of vegetables each day and what particular vegetables should be in the diet every week: 3 cups of greens; 2 cups of orange; 3 cups of legumes; 3 cups of starchy vegetables; and  $6\frac{1}{2}$  cups of other vegetables.

She explained how much fun and how much money is saved when we plant our own vegetable seeds and watch them turn into plants that produce the vegetables we eat.

Melody and the children planted vegetable seeds at the children's schools. By the end of March, about 350 children had planted vegetables at their schools and had seedlings to take home. Follow up conversations with the children's teachers confirmed that the seeds had sprouted and that the children were excited to take their seedlings home and plant them.

producer and marketer of shell eggs in the United States. In 2010, they sold approximately 805 million dozen shell eggs, which represented about 18% of domestic shell egg consumption in the United States.

Federal Judge Brian A. Jackson to Address 2011 SULC Commencement May 14

Judge Brian A. Jackson of the United States District Court, Middle District of Louisiana, will deliver the 2011 Commencement address for the Southern University Law Center at 10 a.m., Saturday, May, 14, in the F.G. Clark Activity Center on the Southern University Baton Rouge campus.

More than 140 graduates are expected to receive the Juris Doctor Degree this spring.

Judge Jackson, a 1985 SULC graduate and the first alumnus to be appointed to the federal bench, was nominated by President Barack Obama on October 29, 2009, to a seat vacated by Judge Frank J. Polozola.

A former shareholder in Liskow and Lewis in New Orleans, Judge Jackson joined the firm following a 16-year career in the U.S. Department of Justice. He has served as United States Attorney for the Middle District of Louisiana, First Assistant United States Attorney for that district, and Associate Deputy Attorney General in Washington, D.C.

Jackson earned a bachelor's degree from Xavier University of Louisiana. While a law student at SULC, he was the editor of the Southern University Law Review. He also earned an LL.M. from Georgetown University Law Center. He is the first graduate of the SULC to serve on the Committee on Bar Admissions for the Louisiana Supreme Court, where he wrote the bar examination on criminal law and evidence.

They presented arguments in the case <u>Andrews v. Belding</u>, involving a high school female student Maria Andrews, who wore a tuxedo to school for four days to protest the omission of her friend's photograph from the school's year book because the friend chose to take the picture in a tuxedo.

Andrews was suspended for five days and prohibited from running for President in the school's election.

The case focused on the issues of symbolic speech and whether the wearing of the tuxedo by Andrews was a substantial or material disruption of the school's educational process.

The SULC Chapter of the Marshall-Brennan Constitutional Literacy Project was founded in 2009 and Vice Chancellor Jones is the founding director.
