

SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY BATON ROUGE

- 1. DEMOLITION OF FOUR DORMS Demolition of four (4) vacant, deteriorated dormitories buildings on the Southern University Baton Rouge Campus that are obsolete, unsafe and unsanitary. These buildings are located next to the new Intramural Athletic Complex that is currently under construction. These blighted dorms are an eyesore for the Student Life Zone and well as the Intramural Athletic Zone of the campus. The dorms are masonry and steel construction, with approximately 33,000 sq. ft. each. Some abatement is necessary to remove asbestos from the dorm buildings.
 - Architects: Noland and Wong Design fee \$104,194. Interim Emergency Board Funds (IEB).
 - \$ 1,630,000 is the scheduled project budget interim Emergency Board Funds (IEB). Project No. IEB-19-616-11-08, Part 01.
 - Architect signed contract April, 2012.
 - Construction documents for demo bid July 10, 2013 for bids on Morris Henry Carroll Hall, Mildred McKinley Satterwhite Hall, Ollie Butler Moore Hall and Octavia Head Clark Hall and Octavia Dining Hall.
 - Contract environmental abatement in progress.
 - Virginia Wrecking Company was the low bidder at \$787,747.00.
 - Contractor has been given 180 days to complete project due to environmental issues involving abatement.
 - Proceed order issued for Contractor to begin work September 23, 2013
 - Project is progressing well, 25% complete.
 - Abatement is complete on Satterwhite and Butler.
 - Abatement started on top floor of Carrol.
 - Project will be completed by March, 2014.
- 2. BASEBALL SUPPORT FACILITY Project involves providing a New Baseball Facility, with Coaches Offices, Locker Rooms, Conference Room, Break-room and Batting Cage.
 - Architect: McElroy and Associates Design fee \$70,000- Bond funds
 - \$1,400,000 is the project budget- City Parish Capital Outlay Funds.
 - Corporate Endeavor agreement has been signed and accepted.

- 3. INTRAMURAL ATHLETIC COMPLEX- Project involves providing recreation spaces in a new Intramural Facility funded with bond funds. Designed spaces in the complex, include two basketball courts, two aerobic rooms, Wii game room, refreshment bar, fitness area, weight exercise area, rock climbing wall, locker rooms and showers, restrooms, lobby, offices and storage areas.

The building will house the Underground Railroad Program and its other cultural and community outreach programs and will be one story building totaling 10,132 sq. ft.
 - Hewitt and Washington Architects Design fee \$196,000, Federal funds
 - Design Completed January, 2011
 - Project bid June, 2011. Low bid exceeded AFC budget of \$2,300,000.00.
 - Project in process of value Engineering. Fire Marshall Review completed.
 - New estimate \$3,206,368.00 federal funds and self generated (federal, DOTD, Self-Generated). \$600,000 DOTD, \$900,000 SG, \$1,706,368 Federal.
 - Project is on hold waiting for State DOTD to approve advertising for bid.

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Washington. "This opportunity will allow me to further enhance my leadership capabilities and promote a personal brand, all while networking with other distinguished students and professionals across the country." Senior accounting and finance double major, Joseph Robins said, "It feels great to already have been contacted by Wells-Fargo, Wal-Mart and Mircosoft to line up interviews" at the conference.



Along with the interview process, students had to meet certain requirement to be chosen. Participants were required to have a 3.2 grade point average; be a junior, senior or graduate student; hold a leadership role on campus; and must not be committed to employment at the time of the interview.

Chancellor James Llorens and Dr. Barbara Carpenter Quoted in Diverse Issues in Higher Education

Chancellor James Llorens and Dr. Barbara Carpenter, dean and professor

for Center of International Affairs and
University Outreach, were quoted
in an article in the September 26,
2013 edition of Diverse Issues in
Higher Education magazine. The
article, HBCU-Latino Connection,
focused on HBCUs that are
being deliberate in their
recruitment of Hispanic students.
The article highlighted the influx of
Brazilian students to the Southern
University campus through Brazil's Scientific

Mobility Program. This program provides funding for the best and brightest students from Brazil to study abroad.

Both Dr. Carpenter and Chancellor Llorens agreed that diverse initiatives are critical, especially for HBCUs. "It [Hispanic Recruitment] is successful to a point, but it could be more aggressive," Dr. Carpenter stated, citing the need for bilingual materials for the parents and Hispanic recruiters to meet with them. "Although our focus has been on international outreach, we are also prepared to expand our outreach into the Hispanic community here in Baton Rouge, in Louisiana and in surrounding states... to increase their enrollment here at Southern University," stated Chancellor Llorens.

SU Receives \$900,000 Grant to Fight HIV/AIDS and Substance Abuse

Southern University's Dr. Alma Thornton, director of the Center for Social Research, has been awarded a three-year, \$900,000 federal grant to assist in the prevention of HIV/AIDS and substance abuse. The funding was awarded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Dr. Cecil Duncan, in the Psychology Department, is the co-author and Co-Director of the HIV/AIDs Prevention Award.

The goal of the project is to provide integrated substance abuse and HIV prevention programs to African-American college students, ages 18-24, and non-collegiate young adults in the communities around Southern University at risk of substance abuse and HIV/AIDS.

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"Southern University HIV/AIDS and Substance Abuse Program represents an effort by the university to work within the community," Dr. Thornton said. "With our partners, we share resources, expertise and the common goal of improving our neighborhood."

"As an anchor institution in the Scotlandville Community, Southern University works collaboratively with community residents and leaders to develop and implement programs that improve the conditions and quality of life of community residents," Dr. Thornton stated.

Partners will conduct a community-based needs assessment on the SU campus and surrounding community to identify risks and protective factors, community resources as well as gaps in services.

LANP Scholarship Awarded to First SU Nursing Student



Southern University nursing student, Shelita Burrell, has received the Louisiana Association of Nurse Practitioners' (LANP) Edna Treuting Scholarship Award. She is the first SU nurse practitioner student to receive the coveted award.

The Edna Treuting Scholarship award of \$500 and a certificate is given to a LANP student member who represents the highest qualities envisioned for a nurse practitioner. The Baton Rouge native said winning the scholarship means a great accomplishment

for "my school and the nursing school itself." Ms. Burrell hopes her receiving the award "sets goals for future nurses seeking out higher goals for themselves."

Being the first SU student to receive the award, Ms. Burrell said, shows "that Southern graduating nurses and students can achieve anything they put their minds to." The 35 year-old non-traditional student, and mother of three, says she is "grateful to be honored with this award and accepts it on behalf of her school."

Ms. Burrell's road to success has not been easy. She has to balance motherhood, being a full-time student, going to her clinicals and being a nursing officer in the United States Navy Reserve. Ms. Burrell started her undergraduate career at Southern after eight years in the U.S. Navy. She completed her Bachelor of Science in Nursing and then two years later she returned to Southern to attend graduate school at the College of Nursing and Allied Health.

Southern Lab School Holds Open House for Mini-Labs

The Southern University Lab School held an Open House for a new delivery system in education to children – including those in pre-k and kindergarten - called Mini-Labs.

The event took place Thursday, October 24, 2013 in the former Student Financial Aid building at the corner of Robert E. Smith and Swan streets on the Baton Rouge campus.

The SU Mini-Labs will offer students at the Lab School realtime classes in engineering, law, business, education and other

classes taught by professors and professionals in those fields.



Young students will be able to sit, observe and interact with lawyers and judges in a classroom setting. They will be able to ask tough questions to engineers and successful business owners as part of their daily classroom routine in the mini-labs.

Fall 2013 Roundup on the Bluff

High school seniors were invited to Southern University's annual Roundup on the Bluff set on Saturday, November 16, 2013 in the F.G. Clark Activity Center. Parents and high school juniors were also in attendance.

The Roundup involved university faculty, administrators, financial aid personnel and recruiters. Entertainment was provided by the marching band and cheerleaders. The students also received tickets to attend the Southern University-Clark Atlanta football game.

Students who met certain criteria were offered scholarships at the event. The offers ranged from full scholarships to major assistance and others. "Our intent is to show high school students and their parents that Southern University offers a great and affordable education with limitless opportunities after graduation," said Chancellor James Llorens.

SU's Darnell Caldwell Elected to National Black Nurses Association

Southern University junior nursing student, Darnell Caldwell, was selected as the student representative to the National Black Nurses Association (NBNA) and awarded a scholarship all within a two-day period.

On August 2, 2013 the New Orleans native received a \$3,000 check from the Margaret A. Pemberton Scholarship and on August 4, 2013 she was sworn in as a representative to the prestigious NBNA at its meeting at the Hyatt Hotel in New Orleans.

Ms. Caldwell is believed to be the first Southern student elected to the NBNA board. She was encouraged by the NBNA New Orleans Chapter to run for the position. Her bio and campaign pushed her 67 percent ahead of her opponent to win the seat. Voting was done by members of the organization in 30 states.

According to Ms. Caldwell, the feeling is "humbling and exciting because I was able to attend the conference this year in New Orleans. And to be surrounded by individuals that are successful is amazing. For Southern to be Nursing School of the Year was awesome but now when they see that I am a student representative from Southern, they [people outside of Baton Rouge] want to know about it [Southern] and want to investigate it. They want to know why was this applicant from Southern chosen."

Ms. Caldwell now gets to represent Southern University across the United States at the different conferences proving that Southern produces top-notch students. Throughout the one-year term as a student representative board member, Ms. Caldwell will be the liaison for nursing students. She will be responsible for bringing policies and programs to the organization to help nursing students at all levels.

SU Part of 2.1 Million Transportation Improvement Grant Group

Southern University is part of a five-university consortium sharing in a \$2.1 million 2013 University Transportation Centers grant to improve sustainability in the nation's transportation infrastructure. Dr. Alex Hak-Chui Shin, in the College of Engineering and Computer Science, will be representing Southern as a participant in research to develop sustainable and longer lasting concrete for roads, pavement, and bridges.

"We will be determining how to include more recyclable materials to be used in the development of concrete," said Dr. Shin who teaches transportation engineering and structural engineering on the Baton Rouge campus. Dr. Shin has an expertise in concrete materials and pavements, and will contribute on the experimental and numerical study of the project. He will contribute on the rapid pavement construction and recycled materials

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The consortium will be led by Missouri University of Science and Technology. The other schools, including Southern, are Rutgers University, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and the University of Miami. The University Transportation Center project, named Research on Concrete Applications for Sustainable Transportation (RE-CAST), will carry out multi-scale and multi-disciplinary students to investigate the use of innovative materials and structural systems for enhance the durability and sustainability of the transportation infrastructure.

Southern Goes Green with its Caps and Gowns from Recycled Plastic Bottles

Southern University is working to "Go Green" and one big step is to change the graduation caps and gowns for ones made from 100 percent post-consumer recycled plastic bottles. Dr. Brandon Dumas, Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs, said "This fall's graduating class will be the first to don new gowns made entirely of 100 percent recycled plastic bottles, the

product of a joint effort by the Student Government Associations, Campus Bookstore, and Student Affairs to 'Go Green' for commencement."



The new caps and gowns, produced by GreenWeaver, are softer, lighter and good for the environment and for Southern's campus. They are even a few dollars cheaper for the undergraduate gowns than last year. Each gown is made of around 23 plastic bottles. Essentially, Southern students are helping to keep these bottles out of the landfills.

University Campus Bookstore Store Manager John Dyer took the idea of going green with the caps and gowns to Dr. Dumas and SGA President Simone Bray after attending a Sustainability Week event held at Southern. Mr. Dyer said the supplier for SU's caps and gowns, Oak Hall Cap & Gown, is part of the GreenWeaver Movement that produces these recycled plastic gowns.

"We are promoting more of Follett's sustainability efforts and trying to help the school be more conscience of the reduce, reuse and recycle," said Mr. Dyer. Other universities and colleges have already started using caps and gowns made of recycled plastic bottles. Mr. Dyer said that Southern may be the first among Historically Black College and Universities to use the recycled gowns.

Southern plans to go further with the "Go Green" campaign. "Innovative sustainability efforts such as these are glowing examples of our commitment to cleaner, safer

communities," Dr. Dumas said. "The Division of Student Affairs, and the institution as a whole, will continue to identify new ways to create a cleaner, safer, and more forward-leaning environment in our state."

Darrell Roberson Selected for Television Academy Seminar

Southern University's Darrell Roberson, instructor and media engineer in Mass Communication, has been selected as one of 20 faculty fellows for the 25th Annual Academy of Television Arts and Sciences Faculty Seminar. "My selection as a fellow is an honor for me as well as the university," said Mr. Roberson on this opportunity. "It sends the message that the Mass Communication program here at Southern can compete with any program in the nation."



Faculty Fellows were chosen from universities such as the University of Alabama, Temple University, the University of Wisconsin and others. The Television Academy Foundation's Education Programs offers the fellows opportunities to witness how television entertainment works behind the scenes.

Southern University's ROTC Tops Among HBCUs in the 6th Brigade

The Southern University's Army ROTC program is now top ranked among Historically Black Colleges and Universities in the AROTC's 6th Brigade, topping units at schools including Grambling State, Florida A&M and Jackson State universities. The Southern unit has jumped 17 spots in the overall rankings, rising from the bottom of all 39 schools in 2012-2013 in the 6th Brigade to 22nd place in just one year.

The announcements were made in late September from the headquarters of the 6th Brigade District in Savannah, Georgia. The 6th Brigade District includes schools in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. The other HBCU schools in the 6th Brigade include Tuskegee University, Alcorn State University, and Alabama State University.

ROTC programs are ranked every year based on the overall performances of the junior class cadets during their summer Leadership Development and Assessment Course

(LDAC) held in Fort Lewis, Washington. The tests include physical training, land navigation, confidence training, field leader's reaction courses, maneuver training and more.

SU's Army ROTC hopes that with the jump in ranking, the number of cadets in the program will continue to rise and that the SU unit, once a prestigious program, will return to the days of glory that produced nine generals in the United States Army.



Accreditation & Academic Excellence Initiatives:

The SARPD Committee approved the following guidelines for College-Sponsored Field Trips:

- Field trips should be aligned with specific course topics or course learning objectives
 - Field trips should be included in the course syllabus so that students will know from the beginning of the semester that they are required to participate
 - Dates for field trips should be planned and announced in advance so that students can make proper arrangements to participate
 - 4. Field trips should be cleared by the SARPD Committee, whenever possible
 - Sites for field trips and officials to meet at the site should be carefully selected to ensure alignment with learning objectives
 - Students must be briefed about proper decorum, the relevance of specific field experience, and be required to ask questions and take appropriate notes documenting what was said, done, and learned during the trip
 - Students must be required to prepare a detailed report at the conclusion of each field experience which will be submitted for grading by the instructor
 - Field experience report grades should be significant to make the sacrifice made by participants worthwhile
 - Images and findings from field trips should be captured for inclusion in college publications
- Under the theme "Bridging the gap between academics and industry" the ITTM committee met and recommended the creation of an In-house Students Career Assistance (IHSCA) position at the CBA to perform the following functions:
 - a. Collect and maintain information on type and source of available jobs
 - b. Create and maintain a database of our alumni
 - c. Create a network between our alumni and current students
 - d. Survey on available jobs and salary expectation
 - e. Resume and interview training
 - f. Advising on future jobs and continue higher education

The service will be available to current students, alumni, and potential employers.

- The Department of Business Administration and the Department of Computer Information Systems have been meeting to review and address changes caused by the name changes of Business Entrepreneurship to Business Administration and Management Information Systems to Computer Information Systems.
- The LGCA Committee reported that Second Generation Assessment continues in the CBA with the assessment of the Technology, Analysis, and Discipline-specific learning objectives in the fall of 2013. SULC Ranks No. 1 in Most Diverse Faculty and Named a Best Bargain Law School for Black Students



SULC latest rankings remain high in the areas of "Most Diverse Faculty," "Best Environment for Minority Students," "Most Chosen by Older Students," and "Best Bargain Law School of Black Students."

SULC is one of the nation's most outstanding law schools and is ranked #1 in most faculty diversity, according to the education services company, The Princeton Review, which features SULC in the new 2014 edition of its book, The Best 169 Law Schools.

Also SULC has been named a Best Bargain Law School for Black Students in the second edition of the Black Student's Guide to Law Schools 2014.

The Princeton Review does not rank the law schools in the book on a single hierarchical list from 1 to 169, or name one law school best overall. Instead, the book has 11 ranking lists of the top 10 law schools in various categories, such as "Most Diverse Faculty," in which SULC gets the top ranking for the third year in a row; "Best Environment for Minority Students," in which SULC ranks # 2 up from the #3 spot last year; and "Most Chosen By Older Students," in which SULC ranks #3, down one spot from last year's ranking.

The top 10 lists are based entirely or partly on The Princeton Review's surveys of 18,000 students attending the 169 law schools profiled in the book. The lists in the book are posted at www.PrincetonReview.com/law-school-rankings.aspx.

Published by Lawyers of Color, the second edition of Black Students' Guide to Law Schools was released on October 31. Lawyers of Color was initially founded as On Being A Black Lawyer but now also produces publications for lawyers of South Asian American, Pacific Asian American, Hispanic, and Native American heritage.

SULC/Lafayette City-Parish Consolidated Government enter into agreement to assist in heirship and adjudicated property remediation

The Southern University Law Center (SULC) has entered into an intergovernmental agreement with Lafayette City Parish Consolidated Government to assist in heirship and adjudicated property remediation that has the potential of saving taxpayers thousands of dollars and addressing the root causes of urban blight.

A successful pilot project was conducted this summer where SULC students saved taxpayers thousands of dollars by tracking down the legal heirs of blighted local properties, according to LaComb. Riddick supervised students in the class who prepared abstracts and wrote title opinion letters for several pieces of property that were adjudicated to the City of Lafayette and selected to be part of the Lafayette Heirship and Adjudicated Property Project. The sale of adjudicated properties is a source of revenue for cities and allows property to be placed back on the tax roll, LaComb said.

Chancellor, Freddie Pitcher, Jr. said, "Providing meaningful experiential learning opportunities for our students advances the mission and brand of this Law Center."

Under the agreement, SULC students supervised by an experienced faculty member will assist the city and individual residents in establishing merchantable titles to

properties that fall into the category of either being blighted, or have titles suggestive of litigation, or have been adjudicated to local government for non-payment of taxes.

The partnership, signed by Lafayette officials, Chancellor Pitcher, and SU System President Ronald Mason on October 12, is an outgrowth of a student project prepared for the course, Louisiana Real Estate Transactions, taught by Professors Winston Riddick and Paul Race. As part of his project, Chad LaComb, who is a third-year student and a planner with Lafayette Consolidated Government, drafted the intergovernmental agreement. The ordinance authorizing the agreement was adopted by the Lafayette City-Parish Council and signed by Lafayette City-Parish President Joey Durel. Katrena Porter, a law student participating in the Chancellor's Public Interest Initiative, was also assigned to this project.

ADMINISTRATIVE / CIVIL LAW CLINIC

The Civil/Administrative Law Clinic conducted a workshop on custody, visitation and support options for the organization Grandparents Raising Grandchildren on September 26, 2013 at the Public Library on Scenic Highway. The organization was so impressed with the level of expertise and professionalism exhibited by our students that an employment opportunity was offered on a student in October.

WORKER'S COMPENSATION CLINIC

A Worker's Compensation Clinic was added to the student schedule as an additional clinic offering for the Spring 2014 semester. Worker's Compensation Judges contacted the Law Clinic requesting this legal opportunity for our students and to assist them with a growing population of unrepresented litigants.

JUVENILE LAW CLINIC

The Juvenile Law Clinic student attorneys are now representing parents in criminal prosecution cases for truancy. Heretofore, truancy cases were only handled as quasi-prosecutorial with the result of the children being removed from parental custody. Now, the District Attorney files a bill of indictment against the parents with the penalty being six (6) months in jail. One of our cases resulted in a client being incarcerated for 4 months. There are seven other cases pending in court, but the fear of going to jail because you did not send your children to school has had a chilling effect. The student attorneys are helping to develop the process in which these new cases are to be handled. They have also participated in meetings with District Attorney Hillar Moore, both Judges and other members of the Juvenile Bar.

OFFICE OF FINANCIAL AID

The SULC Office of Financial Aid hosted the second Annual Open House on Monday, October 7, 2013. There were close to 100 students in attendance. Students participated in the financial aid questionnaire drawing, in which the completed survey was used for the fish out -- a fun and educational way to win a door prize.














planning. The GIS Mapping challenge this year was to build a park on 8 acres of vacant land. The youth demonstrated their technology skills in developing a plan for a new park.

SU Ag Center Personnel Attend 2013 Annual Meeting of the American Evaluation Association

The American Evaluation Association (AEA) held its 2013 Annual Conference October 15-20 in Washington, D.C. The AEA is the parent organization of all evaluation associations in North America. The conference targets evaluation professional all over the world which include private practitioners, evaluation personnel from industries, non-profit organizations, governments, educators, advocacy groups, international NGOs, etc.

The theme of the 2013 conference was "Evaluation Practice in the Early 21st Century." This year's conference was really critical given the fact that the United States government experienced a shutdown which impacted all agencies including the US Department of Agriculture/National Institute of Food and Agriculture (USDA/ NIFA). In addition, USDA/NIFA is stepping up its mandate for actual evaluation to show outcomes and impacts on funded projects/ activities. This way, USDA/NIFA is seeking to ensure that resources utilized for research, extension, and teaching have value-adding impacts and can consistently be measured.

Before the conference, preconference workshops were held for two days and conducted by experienced professionals and practitioners including personnel including publishers and academicians, mega evaluation consulting corporations such as Westat, Mosaic, QSR International, ICF International, Sage, Lyceum, Guilford, etc.

According to the AEA statistics, there were over 3,500 registrants for Evaluation 2013, (up 25% from 2012). International registration was up even more. There were 90 Program Chairs, 1,000 presenters and 920 volunteer reviewers.

SU Ag Center's Bridget Udoh, communications specialist and Oscar Udoh, coordinator for planning and evaluation, attended and participated in the conference.

"It was exciting to meet new colleagues from near and far and to see efforts in international outreach coming to fruition," said Oscar Udoh. Over 1,200 sessions were held relating to evaluation and measuring outcomes/impacts, some of them sponsored by the 48 Topical Interest Groups (TIGs) that assist the AEA. Several sessions also dealt with issues such as, the value of evaluation input for strategic planning in agricultural research and extension, evaluation capacity -building, valuing extension impacts in community well-being, cultural competence in evaluation, measuring student achievement: issues and implications for education evaluation, etc. Other presenters shared their knowledge of best practices on subjects related to international evaluation, impact reporting, networking for effective performance measurement, management in the midst of dwindling resources, diversity and building to ensure evaluation cultural competence using AEA Guiding Principles, etc.

A creative, innovative, visionary leader with a passion to improve the quality of health care, Dr. Jones developed a health care consortium to address the shortage of health care practitioners in the Northwest corner of the Mississippi Delta. Having first-hand experience as a respiratory therapist, while working part-time at Northwest Regional Medical Center, Dr. Howard observed a revolving door of health care practitioners and approached the hospital's chief administrator, the late Mr. Tim Mitchell, regarding a partnership to develop and implement health care programs. This partnership resulted in securing nearly \$1,000,000 over a five-year period to support faculty salaries; health care equipment and supplies; and the land to erect a facility to house the programs. Additionally, funding was secured from the Coahoma County Board of Supervisors to build the existing Coahoma Community College Allied Health Care Building which now houses all health science programs. Finally, Dr. Jones assisted with writing and securing nearly \$7 million in grants to support the health science programs.

Dr. Jones' civic and community responsibilities include participation, support, and association for and with the Clarksdale Chamber of Commerce, Clarksdale Rotary Club, Delta Jubilee, Sunflower River Blues Festival, Tennessee Williams Festival, Mississippi Humanities Council, Chief Academic Officers Association for Southern States, Women in Higher Education, and numerous other clubs and organizations. Dr. Howard is also a member of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.

Dr. Jones joined the Southern University System in October 21, 2013, and serves as the Vice Chancellor for Academic and Student Affairs at Southern University Shreveport.



"There's nothing you can do about yesterday and the decisions you made, but there is something you can about right now," she said. "I want to encourage you to make good choices, to believe in yourself and to have good relationships with people you can

Remembering 50 Years Forum Stirs Debate About Future of Civil Rights

Associate Professor and Coordinator of Sociology Clifford Collins and others listen to the Rev. H. Calvin Austin speak during the Civil Rights Movement program at Southern University Shreveport. Rev. H. Calvin Austin still remembered marching throughout the streets of Shreveport for justice 50 years ago. However, the question everyone was curious to know the answer to was "Where do we go from here?" "Quit looking at political affiliations, quit looking at pigmentation of skin and quit looking at economic status," Austin said. "Come together not only as people of a race, but as a makeup. Together we stand, and divided we fall."

The forum highlighted monumental events, as well paid homage to local and national leaders in the civil rights movement. Students re-enacted some of the movement's most pivotal moments and key players, including Martin Luther King




Jr., Malcolm X, the Black Panther Party, 16th Street Baptist Church bombing, Montgomery bus boycotts and the cafeteria sitin of four

North Carolina A&T University students.

"I knew previously about the different civil rights movements nationally, but I never knew about civil rights movements locally in Shreveport, so participating gave me a chance to research more about the different types of marches we did," said freshman Billy Anderson, who portrayed Martin Luther King Jr. "I took away just to remember what happened and try not to repeat it like getting registered to vote and enhancing your future to the best of your abilities and not just waiting, but living your life to its full aspect."

The forum consisted of a panel including Austin, professor Clifford Collins, attorney Jerry Edwards, Judge Leon Emmanuel and attorney Mary Jackson. Each member of the panel addressed selected questions ranging from "Whose responsibility is it to keep the movement going?" "Why should we take time to remember the civil rights movement?" "Was it necessary what took place 50 years ago?" to "What do you think was the turning point for nation?"

"The generation that we have here at Southern University is not really aware of the civil rights movement. They have read about it, they've seen it on films, but they weren't here and the majority of them weren't born," division chair for Behavioral Sciences Rosalyn J. Holt said of the importance of the forum. "We have some more work to do, but they need to understand the reason they are here is because of the civil rights movement. Everyone that was in this audience today, they are where



they are today because of the struggles."

Holt said with SUSLA being an HBCU in the area, its the school's obligation to educate students on the history of the culture and to continue to provide forums, events and open dialog about what took place 50 years ago.

"I hope that they have been stirred by what they heard the panelists say so that they can go on and continue the work," she said. They take certain things for granted, but if they realize blood was shed, tears, and they need to get out there and do what they need to do, because they are our future."

SUSLA CELEBRATES WITH DIVERSE STUDENT BODY

Students, faculty and staff were invited to visit the exhibit at SUSLA to taste dishes created by students, many of whom came from across the world to attend the university.

"We came here to celebrate and to talk about our culture and our food," said Abdulrahman Salah, a SUSLA freshman, originally from Saudi Arabia. Salah and other Saudi Arabian students brought several

traditional dishes of rice and chicken combined to create kabsa.

"We're trying to show all of the school

and all of the people here our culture," said Ali Awam Almuhamidh, another SUSLA freshman from Saudi Arabia, who shared some insight into the different dining practices of Americans and Saudi Arabians. "When we cook, we eat together and use our hands, we never use a fork." For Salah, the taste of culture event offers an opportunity for students from his country to break misconceptions. "Everywhere we go, people think we are bad people, that we carry bombs, that we are going to do bad things, but actually, that's not right," Salah said. "Islam is actually peace, the main thing of our religion is peace. Everyone

has to pray and understand people."

The event was the first of its kind to be held at SUSLA, said Jo Anne Walker, history professor and one of the chief organizers for the event. "We chose today because it was Halloween, and we didn't want students to be apprehensive about the cultures they derived from," Walker said. "What Southern University is striving to do now is be more diverse and strive to be inclusive. So what we're trying to do is not just look at any one culture, but to bring all cultures here and make them feel welcome." SUSLA's History Department worked with longtime partner the Multicultural Center of the South to organize the event.

"This is just another one of our community outreach projects, and one of the best places to do it is Southern University where you've got a very diverse population" said Janice Gatlin, executive director of the center. "We hope to educate the public of the rich culture that we have here and that everyone can learn about everybody else." By learning about the history behind a culture, misconceptions can be corrected, and insight can be gained, Gatlin said. "People aren't born prejudiced, it's taught and it's learned as they grow up," she said. "But at events like this, people can come and see and talk to other people and take part in some of their traditions and learn about their culture."

The event not only allowed international students to share their cultures, it also gave some SUSLA students a chance to showcase their uniquely American heritage.

"I made Cherokee pepperpot soup. It has various types of peppers in it with hamburger and chicken meat," freshman Olivia Conley said. "I chose Native American because I'm part Native American and my grandmother is full-blooded Cherokee, so I called her and got the recipe."


The event attracted hundreds of SUSLA students who stopped by to learn a bit about their


classmates and sample the traditional foods.

Nwokolo explained to those who attended that his country has three major native languages in addition to English, and has a rich history and culture. "Some people ask how did you learn English, and some of my classmates ask if we have the same cars, or if we live in huts, tents,

I say go to YouTube and check the videos, please. But that's how you start to teach people," he said.




